
HOA AUGUST/SEPTEMBER 2024

The Devil's Stomping Ground Bear Creek, North Carolina

SET BACK FROM THE MAIN road is an empty patch of woods, a dusty circle, barren of plant life, about 15' wide where, according to stories dating back to 1882, the devil comes to dance. The stories go on to say nothing will grow there and animals won't cross this empty patch of woods.



Known as the Devil's Tramping Ground, perhaps the most popular legend about the strip of grass is that if one places anything in the center, no matter how heavy it is, when one comes back the next day, it's been thrown back out overnight, so the Devil has room to dance, and people say they have witnessed red glowing

However, a few years back a journalist from the Greensboro paper spent the night in a tent smack in the middle of it with his two dogs to disprove the story. The reporter stayed the night, though he reported hearing ghostly footsteps circling his tent.

All of which leaves one wondering whether the circle represents the territory of some nocturnal animal, or perhaps the duty of spooking folks has been passed down from generation to generation by locals. Or possibly the tramping grounds are simply so imbued with legend that the stories simply seem to come true in the minds of the viewers.

The Dunhill Hotel Charlotte

The Dunhill Hotel is known for its haunted reputation, particularly involving a man who fell to his death. Guests often report flickering lights, cold spots and the sound of footsteps. LINCOLN COUNTY HISTORY

Lincolnton— A city of history, myth, and legend. Just 40 miles northwest of Charlotte, it's the home of a famous Revolutionary War skirmish, a recently renovated and historically important school, and a mill turned brewery — places that allow visitors to experience the city's historical character with a modern-day flare.

Jason Harpe, the city's resident historian, directed the Lincoln County Historical Association for nearly two decades. He's proud of the way Lincolnton has preserved its historical architecture and built on its history.



Battleground Park was once the site of a battle between the loyalists and patriots.

Battleground Park

One of Lincolnton's most historic locations looks like a peaceful park behind an elementary school. But in June of 1780, Battleground Park — more specifically, a grist mill run by the Ramsour family — was the site of a gruesome battle between British loyalists and American patriots.

A ridge covered with British loyalists who'd camped in the area and were charged with recruiting local farmers. The fighting broke out when the campers "were met

Reenactors and historians regularly hold events at the park to demonstrate just what it was like not only to fight there, but also to live in those days.

"They provide context for what the skirmish even means. It's an immersive experience," says Harpe, who currently works for Richard Grubb and Associates, a leading national cultural resource management firm. "The reenactors engage with the general public to give them more of a feel of what it would have smelled like and what it would have seemed like during the battle."

Ingredients

- 2 pounds boneless skinless chicken breasts, cubed
- 1 can (10-1/2 ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- 1 cup 2% milk
- 2 medium potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 celery rib, sliced
- 1-1/2 teaspoons garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2-1/2 cups frozen mixed vegetables (about 12 ounces), thawed
- 1 tube (16.3 ounces) large refrigerated buttermilk biscuits

Directions

Combine the first 10 ingredients in a greased 4- or 5-qt. slow cooker. Cook, covered, on low until chicken is no longer pink, 4-1/2 to 5 hours. Stir in mixed vegetables; cook 30 minutes longer.

Meanwhile, bake biscuits according to package directions. Spoon chicken mixture into bowls; top with biscuits.
